We offer law programmes across our three campuses and have a Community Law Centre in Mahikeng and a Law Clinic in Potchefstroom. We therefore have a presence in, and understanding of, urban and rural environments.

In our undergraduate studies we incorporate public law, legal philosophy and sound exposure to private and mercantile law, underpinned by criminal and procedural law. The postgraduate offerings on master's and doctoral levels encompass diverse fields, including environmental law and governance, estate law, international child law, labour law, public law and legal philosophy, criminal law and procedure and international trade law.


Faculty facts

- The faculty annually hosts the Juta Mock Trial competition and participates in numerous other moot court competitions.



ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES AND LEGAL ASSISTANCE



In our undergraduate programmes we are committed to academic excellence, have an innovative approach to the teaching of law and aim to offer high-quality instruction in law subjects.

Community Law Centre, Mahikeng Campus

At the Community Law Centre, we are committed to providing quality legal assistance to the community, primarily to indigent people who qualify for free legal assistance. This service is combined with practical legal training of students, who are empowered to apply their acquired legal skills.

The Centre serves the communities surrounding Mahikeng and offers professional and technical assistance to non-profit organisations and traditional councils in the Mahikeng area who share our commitment to social justice. The Centre also trains candidate attorneys for admission as attorneys.

Law Clinic, Potchefstroom Campus

The Law Clinic is involved in a number of projects concerning free legal services, community outreach and capacity building, as well as advisory services.

It operates in the North West and Mpumalanga provinces. The Law Clinic offers practical legal training to students, short courses for lawyers and paralegals, and training to members of the local communities.

Short learning programmes

Any member of the public may enrol for any of these courses, as long as they comply with the admission criteria. Our programmes comply with the prescribed 40-hour formal training and standards set by the court-annexed mediation rules as one of the requirements for registration as a mediator. We will gladly offer any of these as an in-house training programme adapted to your particular needs.

Research Unit for Law, Justice and Sustainability

The Research Unit for Law, Justice and Sustainability addresses developmental and legal challenges in South Africa. All full-time academic staff members of the Faculty of Law and several international postdoctoral fellows participate in the work of the research unit, which has various active research projects.

These are about environmental change, vulnerable societies, cities, law and environmental sustainability, trade finance and investment and justice in practice. These projects deal with crosscutting issues pertaining to both the public and private sector.

Examples are trade, innovation and development, land issues, poverty alleviation, social security and labor rights matters, environmental governance, jurisprudence, the challenges of law in practice, the realisation of socioeconomic rights, religion and culture.

The faculty is proud to have a number of distinguished international scholars associated with our research projects, and also has 12 researchers with National Research Foundation (NRF) ratings (three B ratings, four C1 ratings, two C2 ratings and three Y ratings).

The research unit is closely linked with the accredited journal, Potchefstroom Electronic Law Journal.



DSI/NRF South African Research Chair in Cities, Law and Environmental Sustainability (CLES)

Our research chair aims to develop a new theoretical framework for describing, analysing and developing urban law and governance in South Africa, with a focus on environmental sustainability.

It researches and analyses the legal foundations of urban development and the legally justifiable expectation that governments (including the South African government) should create communities that are safe, sustainable, resilient and inclusive.

The research chair also seeks to equip a new cohort of highly skilled and connected young legal scholars to spearhead this work in academia and legal practice.
